

Subject Strategy Document – MUSIC2022-23

Statement of Intent

At Kehelland Village School, our music curriculum intends to inspire creativity, self-expression and encourages our children on their musical journeys as well as giving them opportunities to connect with others. We hope to foster a lifelong love of music by exposing them to diverse musical experiences and igniting a passion for music. By listening and responding to different musical styles, finding their voices as singers, performers and as composers, all will enable them to become confident, reflective musicians.

Statement of Implementation

Music Curriculum:

At Kehelland Village School the Music Curriculum is currently delivered through the 'Kapow' schemes of work. Music is taught in a block of lessons across one or two weeks each term and children record their learning in their Lighthouse Learning Books.

Kapow Primary's Music scheme takes a holistic approach to music, in which the individual strands below are woven together to create engaging and enriching learning experiences:

- Performing
- Listening
- Composing
- The history of music
- The inter-related dimensions of music

Each five-lesson unit combines these strands within a cross-curricular topic designed to capture pupils' imagination and encourage them to explore music enthusiastically. Over the course of the scheme, children will be taught how to sing fluently and expressively, and play tuned and untuned instruments accurately and with control. They will learn to recognise and name the interrelated dimensions of music - pitch, duration, tempo, timbre, structure, texture and dynamics - and use these expressively in their own improvisations and compositions.

At Kehelland School the aims of our Music curriculum are to develop pupils who:

- Can sing and use their voices individually and in a group.
- Create and compose music on their own and with others.
- Use technology appropriately when composing.
- Have opportunities to learn a wide range of musical instruments- in year 3 they all learn an instrument under the Music Service Trust First Access Scheme.
- Understand and explore how music is created, produced and communicated
- Listen to, review and evaluate the work of great composers and musicians from a range of historical periods, genres, styles and traditions
- Enjoy and have an appreciation of a range of different musical styles e.g. Classical, Rock n roll, Jazz, Blues, Pop, Rock etc.
- Use and understand musical language and include musical features in their own work
- Make judgements about the quality of music

• Have different opportunities to take part in and watch performances.

Classroom Music:

In addition to the children's curriculum music lessons,teachers are encouraged to expose children at Kehelland Village School to music throughout many aspects of the school day. Classical music is often played during transition phases as well as background music during independent learning to help create a calm but purposeful learning environment.

Singing along to learning songs and videos are a daily occurrence at Kehelland Village School, as children learn through participating in singing and dancing. Children's listening skills are also encouraged during this process.

The children in Year 3 are given the opportunity to learn the Trumpet/Cornet through the 'first access' scheme and have weekly whole class lessons with the visiting brass teacher during the Summer Term.

Whole School Music:

Weekly singing assembly takes place on a Thursday afternoon and children sing as a whole school, lead by the Music Subject Lead. Subscription to singup.org forms the framework to this however Cornish heritage is particularly celebrated during singing assemblies as well as religious celebrations such as Christmas and Easter.

In the Autumn terms children sing songs relating to Autumn Harvest and Christmas, culminating in a whole school carol concert in December.



A whole school trip to the Pantomime in December also exposes the children of Kehelland Village School to live music and performance.

In the Spring term children celebrate the Cornish 'St Piran's day' and

sing Cornish folk songs in Spring 1as well as Easter songs in Spring 2. During this term children have the opportunity to take part in a musical workshop with Cornish Folk Singer and Songwriter Will Keating, who visits in March.



In the Summer term children have the opportunity to sing a range of different musical genres, working towards a summer showcase performance to parents at the end of term.

Throughout the year the peripatetic teachers showcase their students learning in performance assemblies. These give all the children at Kehelland Village School the opportunity to watch and listen to live music in action. They can celebrate and be inspired by the success of their peers. Individual Music:

We are very proud of the individual and group music lessons offered at Kehelland Village School as they build on many different skills offered within our curriculum:



Confidence

Lessons and concerts help children achieve together, boosting everyone's confidence. Knowing they have the support of their bandmates gives children a safe place to try new things.

Wellbeing

Playing an instrument is proven to reduce anxiety and promote emotional wellbeing, which improves overall happiness inside and outside school.

Resilience

As a band, children work together to overcome challenges, problem solve and set their own goals. Creating positive learning behaviours to help them progress at school.

Attainment

Learning to play an instrument improves children's memory , numeracy and literacy, boosting their achievement at school and supporting a lifelong love of learning.

Behaviour

Learning an instrument develops the part of the brain that deals with behaviour regulation and motor skills, improving children's focus and progress in class.

Inclusive

Playing in a band is a great leveller. Everybody starts at the same point regardless of ability, which can have a huge impact on children with special educational needs or those with English as an additional language.

Children from Year 2 onwards have the opportunity to join the 'Rocksteady' band taught by an outside agency. Parents can sign their child up for weekly lessons and then are informed of progress and treated to frequent performances by the bands involved. In doing so they understand the different principles of creating notes, as well as how to devise and read their own musical scores and basic music notation. They also learn how to compose focussing on different dimensions of music, which in turn feeds their understanding when listening, playing, or analysing music.

Tater Du class. The children are working towards their ARBSM grades and perform at least once a year in a parent assembly.




Wider Community Music:

At Kehelland Village school we are fortunate to contribute to many aspects of music within the wider community. A highlight for the year is the Trevithick Day celebrations in Camborne. Students from Tater Du take part in the morning dancing and in the afternoon the whole school are invited to sing on the main stage with famous Cornish folk singer/songwriter Will Keating. We also have young instrumentalists involved in community music ensembles such as Camborne Brass and Cornwall Youth Brass Band as well asperformers taking part in the annual Redruth Amateur Musical & Pantomime Society (RAMPS) pantomime.

Statement of Impact

Children at Kehelland have opportunities to forge their own musical journey, which allows them to discover areas of strength, as well as areas they might like to improve upon. The integral nature of music and the learner creates an enormously rich palette from which a child may access fundamental abilities such as: achievement, self-confidence, interaction with and awareness of others, and self-reflection. Music will also

develop an understanding of culture and history, both in relation to students individually, as well as ethnicities from across the world. Children are able to enjoy music, in as many ways as they choose either as listener, creator or performer. They can discuss music and comprehend its parts. They can sing, feel a pulse, add rhythms and create melodies in a group and they can further develop these skills in the future and continue to enjoy and embrace music in their lives. We hope to see a large number of children learning instruments with expert tuition from CMST and other peripatetics. Ultimately, It would be amazing if they continued to show an interest in music and their skills after improve leaving KehellandVillage School and join many of the musical ensembles on offer at secondary school or in local towns such as brass brands.
